Check out our how-to videos

Creating a SmartHub Account

Monitor Your Power Use

Did you know you can look at your electric use every hour of every day? Did you know you can compare your electric use's peaks and valleys to temperature changes? Nothing helps you keep track of when your home is using the most electricity like this tool. It's right there on SmartHub!

Report a Power Outage

No one likes for your power to go out, but you want to make sure you can report it quickly when it happens. This video shows you how to do so with the push of a button!

Sign Up for Auto Pay

Want to save on postage and gas? Want to make sure you never forget to pay your power bill on time? Check out the video on signing up for automatic payments, and you will have one less headache to worry about.

If you have a suggestion for a future how-to video subject, there is even a place to submit those at the bottom of the screen with all the posted videos. We would love to hear from you! Some topics that we are already considering for the future are "How Your Cooperative Handles Outage Restoration" and "How to Use Our Kiosks."

Fulton and Radcliff joined 35 other high school students sponsored by South Carolina electric cooperatives on the unique experience. The students visited Riverbanks Zoo & Garden, explored electric vehicles and toured the State House, culminating with a visit inside the Governor's office. The students also

learned about legislative advocacy from S.C. state Rep. Kirkman Finlay and John Frick, vice president of government affairs for The Electric Cooperatives of South Carolina.

"It's been my dream since middle school to advocate for children's education," says Radcliff, a student at Waccamaw

High School. "I know I have to get my foot in the door of politics, and this gave me the perfect opportunity to do so."

The students also visited Newberry Electric Cooperative, where they heard stories of outages and saw the dangers of electricity. They were also lifted in the bucket of a boom truck.

"I loved going to the co-op in Newberry and seeing their different areas," says Fulton, who attends Andrews High School. "I loved how their set-up was, especially dispatch."
